1.4 Theories of Translation

Nida (1964: 161-164) said that definitions of proper translating are almost as numerous and varied as the persons who have undertaken to discuss the subject. This diversity is in a sense quite understandable; for there are vast differences in the materials translated, in the purpose of the publication, and in the needs of the prospective audience. Nida and Taber (1969: 12) says "who postulate translation consists in reproducing in the receptor language the closest natural equivalent

of the source language message, first in terms of meaning and secondly in terms of style (Emphasis

is mine)."

Every country has different language, culture, and it influences the

language use. People could not understand every language that exist in the world, so many

differences are faced by human being and all of those must be finnished. And from the diffrences

describe above, it is needed the process of translation. Translation is a way to translate a language

or a text from source language (SL) into target language (TL). Not only the meaning but also the

content and message should be translated in translation process. Newmark (1971:7) defines

translation as "translation is a craft consisting in the attempt to replace a written message and/or

statement in one language by the same message and/or statement in another language."

McGuire (in Suryawinata (2003: 15) said that translation involves the rendering of source

language (SL) text into target language (TL) so as to ensure that (1) the surface meaning of the

two will be approximately similar and (2) the structure of the SL will be preserved as closely as

possible, but no so closely that the TL structure will be seriously distorted.

1.5 Methods of Translation

Newmark (1988: 81) mentions the difference between translation methods and translation

procedures. He writes that, "while translation methods relate to whole texts, translation procedures

are used for sentences and the smaller units of language." According to Newmark (1988: 45),

that the translation method is divided into eight types. As follows:

1. Word-for-word Translation

In which the SL word order is preserved and the words translated singly by their most

common meanings, out of context. (Newmark, 1988:46).

Example:

SL: He is a student

TL: Dia adalah seorang pelajar

2. Literal Translation

In which the SL grammatical constructions are converted to their nearest TL equivalents, but the lexical words are again translated singly, out of context. As pre-translation process, it indicates problems to be solved.(Newmark, 1988:46).

Example:

SL: My house is in the right side.

TL: Rumahku berada di sisi kanan.

3. Faithful Translation

It attempts to produce the precise contextual meaning of the original within the constraints of the TL grammatical structures. It transfers cultural words and preserves the degree of grammatical and lexical deviation from SL norms. It attempts to be completely faithful to the intentions and the text realisation of the SL writer. (Newmark, 1988:46).

Example:

SL: Ben is too well aware that he is naughty.

TL: Ben menyadari terlalu baik bahwa ia nakal.

4. Semantic Translation

Which differs from 'faithful translation' only in as far as it must take more account of the aesthetic value of the SL text. compromising on 7 meaning where appropriate so that no assonance, word play or repetition jars in the finished version. it does not rely on cultural equivalence and makes very small concessions to the readership. while 'Faithful' translation is dogmatic, semantic translation is more flexible.(Newmark, 1988:46).

Example:

SL: He is a book-worm

TL: dia yang suka membaca buku..

5. Adaptation Translation

Which is the freest form of translation, and is used mainly for plays (comedies) and poetry; the themes, characters, plots are usually preserved, the SL culture is converted to the TL culture and the text is rewritten.

Example:

SL: Dear, don't make it bad.

TL: Sayang, jangan tinggalkan aku.

6. Free translation

It produces the TL text without the style, form, or content of the original. Usually it is a paraphrase much longer than the original so-called 'intralingual translation', often prolix and pretentious, and non translation at all.(Newmark, 1988:46).

Example: UNIVERSITAS ISLAM NEGERI SUNAN GUNUNG DIATI

SL: The flowers in the garden.

BANDUNG

TL: Bunga-bunga tumbuh di taman

7. Idiomatic translation:

It reproduces the 'message' of the original but tends to distort nuances of meaning by preferring colloquialisms and idioms where these do not exist in the original. (Newmark, 1988:47).

Example:

SL: How was your exam? Well, it's difficult

TL: Bagaimana ujian mu? Ya, itu bagaikan berenang melawan arus

8. Communicative translation

It attempts to render the exact contextual meaning of the original in such a way that both content and language are readily acceptable and comprehensible to the readership. (Newmark, 1988:47).

Example:

SL: Beware of the dog!

TL: Awas anjing galak!
